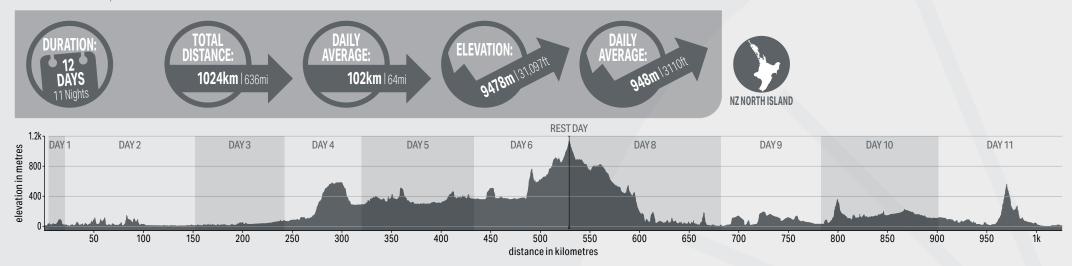




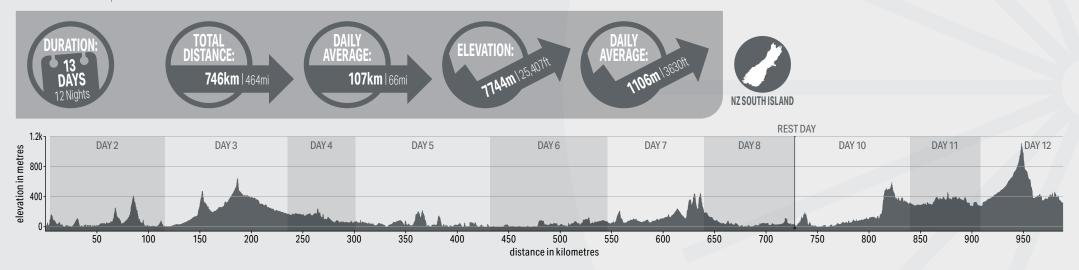




STAGE 1 | NORTH ISLAND

Discover this fantastic country sitting on the edge of the world

Our route takes in highlights across both the North and the South Island. From the thermal wonderland of Rotorua, rich with Māori heritage, to the volcano country surrounding Tongariro National Park. From the wild west coast with its pristine nature to the stunning Southern Alps. This Epic Adventure to the southern hemisphere's most beautiful islands ticks all the boxes.



First day guidance

For meeting at the start of each stage please come dressed in regular clothes. Look out for the guides at the appointed time in their Ride & Seek attire or simply ask at the hotel reception where to find the group and they will direct you accordingly. The usual first day format involves grabbing a bite to eat together and the guides talking about the tour. We then focus on fitting bikes and set a time to meet in bike gear for a warm-up ride before catching up for pre-dinner drinks with the rest of the group.

Stage 1 - North Island

Saturday 3rd February – Wednesday 14th February

For Stage 1 we will meet you at 12:00, Saturday 3rd February, at the M Social Auckland (196-200 Quay Street, Auckland CBD, 1010): **Click for M Social Hotel website.**

Both the Auckland domestic and international airports are located approximately 25km drive south of our hotel and are a short walk or free bus shuttle from one another. A taxi or Uber will take you between 25 to 50 minutes depending on the traffic. Skybus operate an express bus service into the city that finishes 300m from our hotel. Its normal operating hours are every 15 minutes throughout the day and every 30 minutes during the night. It takes approximately 45 minutes followed by a 5 minute walk.

We finish Stage 1 in the country's capital, Wellington on Wednesday 14th February. The airport, which services both national and international flights is 10km drive from our hotel, the InterContinental Wellington (2 Grey Street, Wellington, 6011): Click for InterContinental Wellington website.

A taxi or Uber will take between 15 to 30 minutes to the airport, alternatively the bus takes approximately 45 minutes, which includes 10 minutes walking.

If you enjoy long (11 hours) train journeys, The Northern Explorer runs 3 times a week between Wellington and Auckland. To find out more information:

Stage 2 - South Island

Wednesday 14th February – Monday 26th February

For Stage 2 we will meet you at 12.00, Wednesday 14th February, at the InterContinental Wellington (2 Grey Street, Wellington, 6011): Click for InterContinental Wellington website.

The airport is located approximately 10km drive from our central hotel and will take approximately 15 to 30 minutes with a taxi or Uber. A local bus also goes to the airport and takes 45 minutes, which includes 10 minutes walking time. If travelling through Auckland arriving by train is another option, The Northern Explorer runs between the two cities on an 11 hour journey, 3 times a week. Tour Conclusion

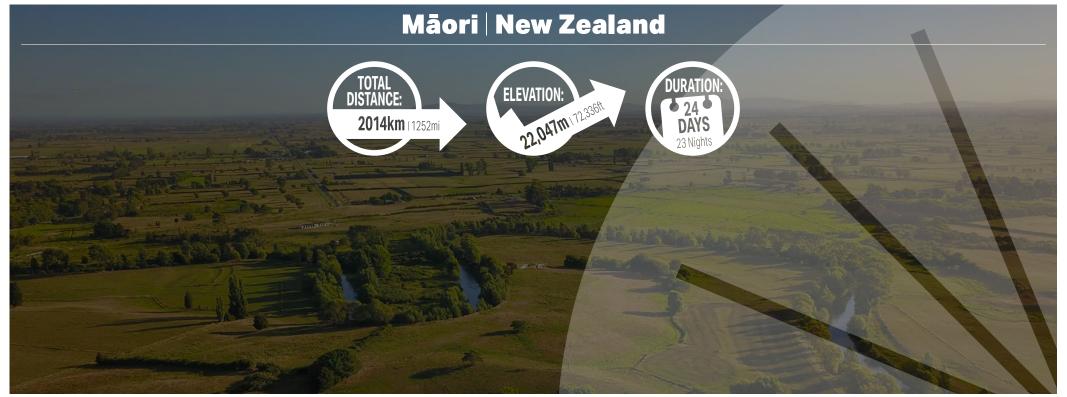
Monday 26th February

We will ride into Queenstown on Sunday afternoon on 25th February.
The final hotel of the tour is QT Queenstown, (30 Brunswick Street,
Queenstown 9300) – Click for QT Queenstown website.

After breakfast on Monday 26th February the tour concludes with the guides departing with the support vehicle and hire bikes. For those travelling back to, or through Australia, it is possible to fly internationally from Queenstown Airport, which lies 8.5km from our hotel, a 15 to 20 minute taxi ride. Alternatively a bus departs approximately 7 minutes walk from the hotel and takes 25 minutes. Most people however will fly domestically via Auckland to return home departing from the same small airport in Queenstown.

Queenstown is considered the adventure capital of New Zealand and offers no-end of outdoor experiences. If you are considering extending your holiday by a few days post-tour have a look at **Click to access Discover Queenstown**.

The North Island of New Zealand is known for its national parks, volcanic activity and cosmopolitan cities, the largest of which is Auckland.



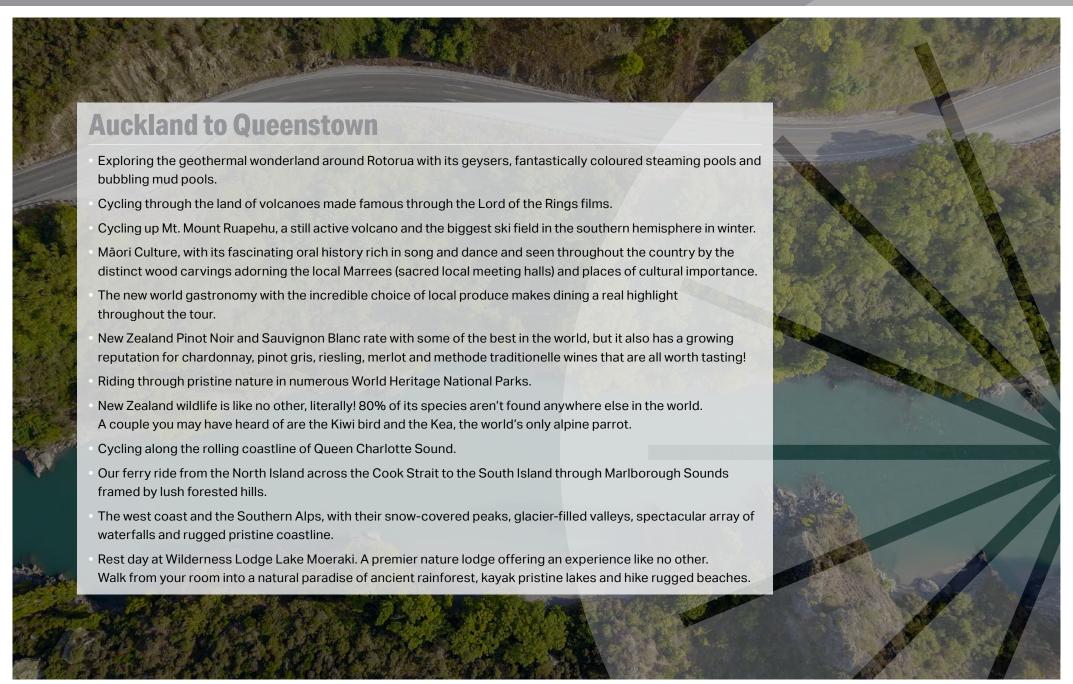


STAGE 2 -**Wellington to Queenstown**

The South Island of New Zealand is renowned for its mountains, lakes and glaciers. The Southern Alps is home to Mt. Aoraki at 3,724 metres high.























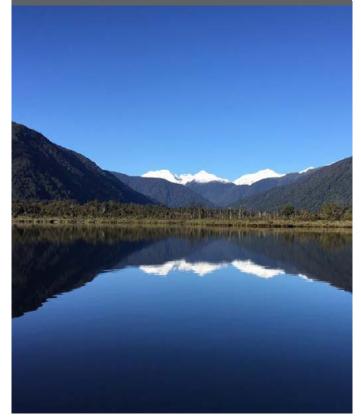






We carefully select the places where we stay based on their personality and the hospitality of our hosts.

From volcanos to glaciers

The Māori New Zealand Cycling Tour follows the journey of a fascinating and inspiring people as they travelled across the ocean 700 years ago to arrive on the North Island near the start of our tour.

The Māori, as they came to be known, with only what they brought with them adapted well to a land that had never seen humans.

Isolated from other landforms for 80 million years it had moved further east away from Australia and grew through volcanic activity in the North Island and mountain ranges in the South Island. A process that continues today.

This strange land was the last to be discovered of all the habitable land masses in the world and was different in that, apart from bats that had managed to fly there, it was completely devoid of mammals. New Zealand was and still is a land of birds and reptiles.

As the newly formed settlements grew the Māori travelled south down through the land of volcanoes, geysers and colourful bubbling hot pools.

This geologically active part of New Zealand became an important part of the mythology of Māori culture. While the culture may be young, it is rich, diverse and has built on its Pacific island origins to become unique in its own right.

Using their impressive boat building skills the Māori continued south crossing the Cook Strait to reach the South Island where they settled the coastlines and mountain valleys right to its most southern point.

The Māori population in the South Island remained much lower than in the North Island as the winters are difficult and the terrain tough. This is as true today as it was 150 years ago, with three-quarters of the New Zealand population residing in the North Island. It's for this reason the South Island is thankfully still a part of the world that showcases how the earth once was with its largely untouched nature.
